In our first year, we hired 4 staff with a hope that people would buy soup and provide a critical boost in income for people who were struggling to pay their bills. Five years in, your soup purchases, volunteer hours, and donations have employed 27 people through at 4 Raw Carrot locations. You are awesome!!

We started with small, but mighty(!), passion. When we saw the unmistakable results of employment that your support created – dignity,

purpose, community, increased financial security and the tangible outpouring of Jesus love in action – we knew we wanted to keep going.

The road has not been easy. The margins on soup are slim. Carving a new path (integrating ministry and business) has been challenging. What was exciting and new when our staff first started and hadn't worked in many years, has become monotonous – like any job, with it's ups and downs.

However, five years has brought stability. Most small businesses fail within three years...your support has helped us thrive beyond three years. We've started pilot projects, learned



lessons, and had our hearts broken when we didn't get funding. We've started to even out, to find balance, to sustain ourselves, and to remain committed over the long term, thanks to you!

God has been SO faithful.

This ministry has been an ongoing test of faith...a journey to trust Him completely, and He has walked the road with us.

With our five-year Anniversary behind us, the excitement of a "start up" ministry has worn off, but the passion hasn't changed. You have helped us share the love of Jesus in word and action. see the gifts and talents of each unique person He has created, and find opportunities for each person to have purpose and meaning. Each year, we perform evaluations with the staff at all the sites. Methods include anonymous survey's, focus group discussions & stories to learn more about how we can improve and better serve those who are working with us. Your support has resulted in

over 70% of the staff would like to work more hours at the Raw Carrot than they currently do, if that became an option. This suggests a both high level of satisfaction with working at the Raw Carrot and also indicates that the jobs made possible by the Raw Carrot are filling a need for good quality, supportive, part-time employment for people on ODSP." 
of staff feels the quality of life (overall) has increased. Increased happiness also scored 88%, Increased Confidence 83%, and an increased sense of community scored 72%. Yet 42% of staff experience pain during the working hours.

 Of the staff across the 4 sites, the strongest motivation for working at the Raw Carrot is the satisfaction of having a job (43%) followed by keeping busy (22%) and money / learning new skills (tied at 13%)

MEET MONICA

Your Support Has Helped Create Employment for so Many, Including Monica

Having grown up on a farm, Monica is used to working hard. But the reality of not being capable of traditional work due to debilitating mental illness compounded with fibromyalgia and arthritis has been extremely "demeaning" and an ongoing battle to find balance.

Monica is a single mom with 2 grown children and 4 grandchildren. She suffered a mental breakdown in 1995 and hasn't had a (paid) job in 24 years. She tried to get work in the past, "a few months here and there", but couldn't successfully hold down employment. At one point, her depression was so bad that she couldn't get out of bed. "I had to call my daughter because things were so bad that I literally couldn't get up".

When asked about the most significant challenges as a person living with disAbilities, Monica explains that one of the hardest aspects to manage is the lack of community. "Having a disability has isolated me. People don't realize how much of their social life comes from their work. I've done some volunteering which has kept me in touch with people, but when you suffer from mental illness people just don't understand what it's like."

The stigma of mental illness is another aspect that Monica references in the context of securing employment. "If you tell an employer that you have a mental illness, they want to get away; they're scared to even hear it. I have always felt that pressure to live up to people's expectations — I push myself so hard because I don't want people to be unsatisfied or disappointed."

Through your support, Monica was hired in October and was thrilled by the opportunity for supportive employment close to home. "When I heard I got the job, I was ecstatic! I called my Mom right away."

"I've always really wanted to contribute to my own welfare" Monica admits. She softly smiles as she talks about her new role. "Now that I'm working, the best part of the job is the interaction with other people. And feeling worthwhile."

WHAT PEOPLE TELL US

"Poverty has two parts, lack of economic opportunity which then means lack of income. No income means poverty. Poverty often means stress, desperation, and despair. There is a financial side and a human side... By purchasing from these social enterprises you support the re-design of employment that is one small step towards defeating poverty."


REVENUE – THIS IS WHERE OUR MONEY COMES FROM:


